India reports 215 Covid-19 cases, lowest since April 2020




NEW DELHI: India reported 215 new coronavirus infections and one Covid-related death in the last 24 hours across the country, according to the Union health ministry.

This takes the country's total tally of Covid-19 infections from the beginning of the pandemic to 4,46,72,068.

With a decrease of 141 cases from the previous day, India's active declined to 4,982, according to the Union health ministry data on Tuesday morning.

The active cases comprise 0.01 per cent of the total infections.



One death due to Covid-19 in India in last 24 hours



The national recovery rate stands at 98.80 per cent, the health ministry said. The number of people who have recuperated from the disease surged to 4,41,36,471.

According to the health ministry, 219.91 crore of Covid vaccination doses have been administered in the country so far under the nationwide inoculation drive.

India's Covid-19 tally had crossed the one-crore mark in December, 2020, two crore in May, last year and three crore in June, 2021. The four crore mark was breached in January, this year.

What science says...

For example, a single hamburger contains 500 calories, 25 grams of fat, 40 grams of carbs, 10 grams of sugar, and 1,000 milligrams of sodium, which is enough to cause havoc in your system.

After 15 minutes of your first bite of burger, you will experience a massive surge of glucose. This triggers the release of insulin, which makes you feel hungry again in a few hours. Repeating this pattern can increase the risk of diabetes. In scientific terms, the process of taking excessive calories in one sitting puts oxidative stress on cells.

Having a meal high, which is loaded with saturated fat can be harmful to your health. Punjab drug fight runs into AIDS rise



Already grappling with the problem of drug addiction in the state, Punjab government is faced with another dimension of the scourge: Rise in number of HIV-AIDS cases, which have reached alarming proportions in recent years.

A Class XII student and seven other addicts in the 18-23 age group testing positive for HIVAIDS in Sangrur this July is a startling indicator of the gravity of the issue.





As the abuse of drugs increase the risk of HIV infection, the rise in number of HIV-AIDS cases is not surprising as Punjab is home to about 7.2 lakh drug addicts.

Beginning with sharing of contaminated syringe to inject drugs, HIV spreads through sexual transmission from injectable drug users (IDUs) to others. The students' case prompted the health department to launch a drive against drug addicts exchanging needles.

If data from the substance use magnitude in India-2019 report of ministry of social justice and empowerment government of India is to be believed, Punjab accounts for 10.32% of IDUs in the country. Of 8.54 lakh estimated IDUs in the country, 88,165 are in Punjab. According to annual sentinel surveillance data, there are 9 states in the country having more than 5% HIV prevalence among IDUs and Punjab is ranked third in the country having 12.1% of IDUs -- mostly young unemployed men --carrying HIV. Mizoram tops the list (19.8%) followed by Delhi (16.2%). All IDUs mainly inject pharmaceutical opioids.

Even as IDUs remain the primary driving force behind the HIV epidemic in the state, the focus of the government in carrying the intervention is more in the urban areas as compared to rural areas.

An official of the Punjab State AIDS Control Society (PSACS) revealed that link worker scheme meant for reaching out to vulnerable men and women in rural areas is being run in only two districts – Amritsar and Ludhiana – while targeted intervention in urban areas is there in all districts.

There has been an increase in the number of government deaddiction centres in last two years, but the drug treatment access remains poor among IDUs. At present 178 government-run outpatient opioid assisted treatment (OOAT) clinics and 78 private centres, are providing treatment to only about 2.1 lakh addicts out of an estimated number of 7.2 addicts in the state.

Dr Atul Ambekar of national drug dependence treatment centre and department of psychiatry, All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), who has extensively worked on HIV prevention among IDUs in Punjab, called for need to understand the scale of the response required and then expand the ambit of targeted intervention accordingly to prevent further escalation of the drug-related HIV.

"To tackle the problem, the government will have to ensure improvement in the quality of services and expansion of services to reach individuals on a larger scale," said Dr Ambedkar, who feared that situation will get worse quickly if no corrective steps are taken by the government.

Dr Manpreet Chhatwal, additional project director of Punjab State Aids Control Society, said the increase in number of IDUs is the key reason for spike in number of HIV-AIDS cases. She also attributed the rise in number of cases to screening of more number of people. "Earlier we used to screen about 5 lakh individuals, now the number has gone up to about 12 lakh in a year," Dr Chhatwal pointed out.

She further said that out-patient opioid assisted treatment (OOAT) clinics and private centres, providing treatment to addicts, has also increased where all the addicts are screened.

Staggering Rise

The last 10 years have witnessed a staggering rise of over 64% in the number of new HIV-AIDS cases reported in the state. In 2008-09, a total of 4,954 cases were reported. The figure went up to 8,133 in the year 2018-19. In the first 6 months of the ongoing year, as many as 2,943 individuals tested positive.

From 1993 to June 2019, a total of 74,781 persons have been found suffering from HIV-AIDS of which 8,427 have died. Amritsar, having one of the highest number of drug addicts in the state, has the most number of people suffering from AIDS in Punjab at 16,505 followed by Jalandhar (7,766) and Patiala (7,674).

Punjab health minister Balbir Singh Sidhu said the focus of the department is timely detection as it will help in providing required care and treatment to people infected with HIV. "We are taking all the required steps for curbing the menace," said Sidhu. The state has 13 antiretroviral therapy centres where HIV-infected people are given free treatment.

Another Cause Of Concern

Steady rise in number of intravenous drug users suffering from Hepatitis C virus (HCV) has also emerged as a major concern for the authorities. About 16% of HIV patients screened in last 10 months were found to be suffering from HCV. The number will further increase once the screening of remaining HIV patients for HCV is completed.

HCV, a contagious liver disease, spreads due to blood-to-blood contact by injection drug use and is also sexually transmitted.

The health department has so far screened 18,649 patients from October 22, 2018, to July, 2019. The department found 2,873 patients having both HIV and HCV. Sangrur district has the highest number of hepatitis C cases followed by Tarn Taran. As per the official data, 66,454 cases of hepatitis C have been reported since June 2016 to July 2019 of which 8,506 and 5,813 cases have been reported in Sangrur and Tarn Taran.

To identify cases of hepatitis C, the state government has waived the cost of test of hepatitis C (Rs 881) for all.

The government recently launched a dedicated programme to identify cases of hepatitis C in all its central jails. The state claims to be the first in the country to take such an initiative.

Effort To Check Discrimination

To provide protection against discrimination against people with HIV/AID, the state government has recently notified Punjab Human Immunodeficiency Virus and Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (Ombudsman and Legal Proceedings) Rules, 2019, according to which civil surgeons from divisions— Jalandhar, Ropar, Ferozepur, Patiala and Faridkotwill be designated as ombudsmen of their respective jurisdiction.

What is Pipe/worm composting?

Pipe composting is a kind of vermin composting, often called Worm Tube Composting, carried out within a PVC tube, promoted by World Malyalee Council. This method of composting as a process of waste to wealth is big a success in states like Kerala, Karnataka. Find below a PDF for further reading. For the pipe composting method, we need three PVC pipes of 8 inch or 10 inch diameter and length of about 1.25 meters. The pipes are placed vertically, dug 25-30 cm into the ground. Initially, a small amount of cow dung and jaggery is put in with some mud. Later, only kitchen waste or wet waste is put into the pipe.





Cervical Cancer- Let's be safe rather than sorry

According to World Health Organization's (WHO) estimation, one woman is diagnosed with cervical cancer every minute globally. In India, the data reveals that every eight minutes, one woman dies due to cervical cancer. After breast cancer, Cervical Cancer ranks as the 2nd most common female cancer in India. According to some studies, in India about 160 million women between the ages of 30 and 59 years are at risk of developing this disease, and in 2018, about 96,922 new cases of cervical cancer were registered. Though the numbers paint a grim picture, the silver lining is that cervical cancer can be prevented. Screening can enhance early detection and vaccination can decrease the risk of developing cervical cancer. First, it is important to build awareness about

these lifesaving facts. For that, we must start conversations around HPV or Human Papillomavirus. As women, we need to be aware that HPV infection is extremely common, so much so that most women get it at some time in their lives. Often the virus goes away but in some cases it causes HPV-related cancers or genital warts, over time. HPV type 16 & 18 are responsible for about 83% of all cervical cancer cases in India.

Secondly, we must bring more focus on prevention of this disease. Cervical cancer can be prevented with recommended vaccination and regular screening. Primary method for prevention is through vaccination as it helps to protect against the different types of HPV that commonly cause cervical cancer. While screening tests like the pap smear and HPV test can only be done above the age of 25 years, vaccines that can prevent cervical cancer are recommended to be administered much earlier, from the age of 10. Getting vaccinated at this age protects adolescent girls long before they are ever exposed to HPV infection, and consequently, from cervical and other HPV-related cancers. Much like a child's regular vaccinations, this can be planned in consultation with a

pediatrician.

In India, most women tend to seek out treatment after the cervical cancer has already progressed to an advanced stage, at which point both treatment and recovery is a difficult process. Unlike developed countries where regular screening programs for women help to catch cervical cancer early, women in India do not take part in regular screenings. Most women tend not to seek help for reproductive tract problems, brushing them aside with the belief that it is a part of life as a woman.

Regular screening for all reproductive tract infections is a must for prevention of cervical cancer. Pap smear is the most reliable and effective screening method for diagnosing cervical cancer early.

Recommended for all women aged 25-65 years, the pap smear can be done in a doctor's office or clinic as a simple outpatient procedure. The test specifically looks for pre-cancers and cell changes in the cervix that may become cervical cancer later on if not treated appropriately.

Life is precious, and losing eight precious lives in India every minute from a disease that can be prevented is unthinkable. Let's start this year by building awareness on cervical cancer and its prevention. Let us take responsibility for our own health. Let's visit our gynecologist, participate in regular screenings, vaccinate ourselves and let's be safe rather than sorry.

'Four in 10 Kochi women anaemic'

KOCHI: Nearly four in 10 women in Kochi are anaemic. In other words, they have low haemoglobin levels. Anaemia is a condition that develops when there is lack of healthy red blood cells or haemoglobin in the blood.

The incidence of anaemia was highest in the 20-50 age group, while it was lowest in the girls below the age of 10, as per a study conducted among 1.40 lakh girls and women in the city, ranging from the age group of one day old to above the age of 80. The samples were tested for over a period of two years.

"The most common reason for anaemia is iron deficiency, which can be taken care of with supplements and good nutrition. But in India, women continue to live with anaemia," said Dr Ramesh Kumar, chief of laboratory services, Metropolis Healthcare, Kerala, that conducted the study.

It found that menstruating girls and women are more deficient due to the monthly blood loss. The most common signs to watch out for anaemia would be lethargy, unexplained fatigue, pale skin and pale eyes. In kids, more severe form of anaemia is characterized by a behaviour called pica, where the child builds a tendency to eat dirt, clay and other unusual substances.
